# Q&A

Q: What are the Hammock Camping Requirements?

**A:** "1st Class, a hammock, 1" tree straps. A tarp to cover the hammock, a way to stay warm (either under quilt or insulated pad) at least 1 night trying it out in your backyard, and a plan "B" in case you decide hammock camping isn't for you (ie – having a tent ready during the middle of the night)." – Mr. Coderre

## **High Adventure - Ohio to Erie Cycling Trip**

On the first day, we start by dipping our tires in the Ohio River. Then, we set off on the 16 miles ride to Milford. We got guided by one of Mr. Fanelli' friends because the trail had some construction being done on it. On the second day we biked 17 miles to Kings Island. We split into groups and rode lots of rides for about five hours. Then, we had to bike 10 miles to Morrow. The total of 27 miles took us 2 hours and 22 minutes. On the third day, we rode 5 miles to Morgan's Canoe Livery. We rode in groups of 3 on the canoes. It took about one and a half hours. Then, we rode 17 miles to spring valley. Later that evening we rode another 2 miles to make the day's ride 25 miles to count for the cycling merit-badge. The 22 miles take us 2 hours and 13 minutes. On the fourth day, we rode 36.3 miles from spring valley to London. Afterwards, we biked 2 miles to the London municipal pool. We all hung out for a few hours swimming. Then, we biked back to the campsite. On the fifth and last day, we biked 53 and a half miles. We met up at the Whit's frozen custard to get ice-cream to celebrate the hard journey we had just finished. While we were eating our ice-cream Mr. Fanelli finished the first aid parts of the cycling merit badge. We loaded up the bikes and drove to the church. We unloaded the bikes and waited for the box truck to arrive. We unpacked it. Then closed the trip with a little discussion about how it went.
